Executive summary

VOST Europe is a volunteer-driven network of Virtual Operations Support Teams operating across several European countries, including Portugal, Spain, France, Germany, Slovakia, and Greece. The network supports crisis communication and information verification during emergencies by monitoring online information ecosystems, identifying misleading narratives, and amplifying verified information from trusted sources.

During the reporting period, Europe experienced several significant natural disasters and extreme weather events that generated substantial online information activity. These included the highly destructive Storm Kristin in Portugal, which caused extensive infrastructure damage and widespread power outages, as well as Storm Leonardo, which triggered severe flooding across Portugal and Spain. Additional extreme weather events affected other parts of Europe, including flooding and severe thunderstorms in southern France and major winter storm systems impacting France and Germany.

Such events create environments where information uncertainty is high and misleading narratives can spread rapidly online. During the reporting period, VOST Europe and its national teams monitored online discussions related to these disasters, identifying and documenting misleading or inaccurate content, including the circulation of outdated disaster imagery, speculative narratives regarding causes of incidents, and incorrect information about emergency response measures.

Particular attention was given to wildfire incidents in Portugal, where disinformation narratives circulated widely across social media platforms. Volunteers monitored these narratives, documented misleading content, and supported the dissemination of verified information originating from civil protection authorities and official emergency communication channels.

VOST Europe continued to contribute to the implementation of the European Commission's Code of Practice on Disinformation by participating in the permanent Task Force and collaborating with civil society organisations, researchers, and other stakeholders working to address disinformation. The organisation also continued to support transparency initiatives associated with the Code, including the maintenance and use of the Transparency Centre for publishing monitoring reports.

Through its volunteer network, operational monitoring activities, and awareness initiatives, VOST Europe contributes to strengthening societal resilience against disinformation during crisis situations and supports the availability of reliable information during emergencies.

V. Empowering Users

Commitment 17

In light of the European Commission’s initiatives in the area of media literacy, including the Digital Education Action Plan, VOST Europe continued its efforts to promote media literacy and critical thinking related to disinformation during crisis situations. Through the activities of its volunteer network, the organisation monitored misleading narratives during natural disasters and amplified verified information from trusted sources. These actions contribute to helping citizens better understand how misinformation spreads during emergencies and encourage reliance on verified public information channels.

QRE 17.1.1 [insert wording if adapted]	During the 2025 reporting period, VOST Europe, in collaboration with its national VOST teams, coordinated initiatives aimed at raising awareness of disinformation narratives emerging during natural disasters and extreme weather events. Particular attention was given to wildfire incidents in Portugal and other climate-related events across Southern Europe. Volunteers monitored social media platforms to identify misleading narratives and examples of miscontextualised visual content, including the reuse of imagery from previous disaster events or unrelated locations presented as current incidents. When such content was detected, VOST volunteers documented the cases and supported the dissemination of verified information from official civil protection authorities and trusted emergency communication channels. In parallel, VOST Europe amplified content produced by independent researchers, fact-checkers, and public authorities addressing disaster-related misinformation. These efforts were carried out through the organisation’s social media channels and communication networks, helping to increase public awareness of how misleading narratives can emerge during crisis situations. By promoting verified information and highlighting common misinformation patterns, these activities contributed to strengthening citizens’ ability to critically assess information circulating online during emergencies.

VOST Europe also participated in events, workshops, and collaborative initiatives related to disinformation, crisis communication, and digital resilience. Through these activities, the organisation contributed operational insights derived from its monitoring work during emergency situations. By combining online awareness activities with participation in public discussions on disinformation and crisis communication, VOST Europe contributed to improving public understanding of how misleading narratives can emerge and spread during emergencies.</p>

Particular attention was given to helping citizens identify misleading visual content and unverified claims that can spread rapidly during emergencies.</p> <p>VOST Europe also contributed to broader discussions on disinformation and crisis communication through participation in collaborative initiatives with researchers, civil society organisations, and institutions involved in the implementation of the Code of Practice on Disinformation.</p>

However, the organisation carried out continuous operational monitoring of disinformation narratives related to natural disasters and extreme weather events.</p> <p>Findings derived from these monitoring activities were shared with relevant national civil protection authorities and emergency management organisations. These insights included examples of misleading narratives circulating online, the reuse of miscontextualised visual content, and inaccurate information related to emergency response operations.</p> <p>By sharing these observations with authorities responsible for crisis communication and emergency response, VOST Europe contributed practical knowledge that can support situational awareness and improve the understanding of how misleading information spreads during emergency situations. In addition to monitoring activities, VOST Europe maintained collaboration with civil society organisations and stakeholders involved in the broader ecosystem addressing disinformation and crisis communication.</p> <p>Operational insights gathered through volunteer monitoring activities were shared in relevant discussions and collaborative initiatives, contributing to a better understanding of the dynamics of disinformation during natural disasters and crisis situations.</p>

Measure 34.1	During the reporting period, VOST Europe continued to lead the technical development and maintenance of the Transparency Centre associated with the Code of Practice on Disinformation. Building on the previously deployed platform, the organisation implemented several upgrades aimed at improving usability, accessibility, and navigation. These improvements were introduced following feedback received from

	signatories of the Code and from the European Commission. The upgrades focused on simplifying the structure of the platform, improving the discoverability of reports and relevant documentation, and facilitating easier navigation for both signatories and external users accessing the Transparency Centre.
Measure 34.2	VOST Europe dedicated both human and technical resources to maintaining and improving the Transparency Centre during the reporting period. This included technical development work, user interface improvements, platform maintenance, and support to signatories using the Transparency Centre to publish their reports and information related to the implementation of the Code of Practice.
