

Code of Conduct on Disinformation – Report of Newtral for the period January 2026 – June 2026

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Executive summary

Newtral is a media and technology company founded in January 2018. Our work is divided into three main business areas:

- Fact-checking and data verification. On our website, you can find debunked hoaxes, fact-checks on political statements, as well as explainers, visualizations, and articles from our contributors.
- Audiovisual production for television programs and streaming platforms. Our productions include *El Objetivo de Ana Pastor*, *Dónde Estabas Entonces*, and *Generación Top*, aired on laSexta; *Nevenka* for Netflix; *Sueño Real* for HBO; and *Los Borbones: una familia real* and *Asesinas* on LaSexta.
- Innovation and research based on Artificial Intelligence protocols. We have made significant advancements in various AI-driven fact-checking solutions through automation on a language-agnostic platform powered by Artificial Intelligence and Machine Learning.

At Newtral, we are journalists, engineers, researchers, programmers, producers, directors, editors, graphic designers, and documentalists.

Newtral's fact-checking team is formed by independent journalists who have no relationship with any political party, private interest, or advocacy organization. This team fact-checks the statements of politicians from different parties and public administrations daily, as well as debunks viral misinformation, as well as other related products, such as prebunking, research on disinformation, and narratives. Our fact-checks aim for replicability (so that anyone can follow the process we have followed), and to this end, we include a list of sources we have used, including their links. We also invite readers to contact our team if they detect an error, have any comments about data related to our work, or have any doubts about anything whatsoever.

Newtral has partnerships with Meta and TikTok for debunking content proactively on those platforms. We also have a fact-checking tipline through WhatsApp, where anyone can ask us to verify any content they suspect is false. Besides journalists and fact-checkers, Newtral's team includes engineers and data scientists working on the automation of the fact-checking workflow. We have expertise in deep learning techniques and NLP data analysis. Additionally, we are members of both the EFCSN and the IFCN, reinforcing Newtral's commitment to upholding fact-checking standards, fostering transparency, and promoting the integrity of information.

Newtral's activities also cover other types of journalism and reporting, always highlighting the importance of data analysis and the interrelations between computer science and journalism.

As of 2019, Newtral also has an educational area under the name Newtral Educación, devoted to media literacy, data journalism, and promoting critical thinking in educational centers, universities, and others. Since 2025, Newtral has been part of the UNESCO Media and Information Literacy Alliance.

Newtral joined the Code of Practice on Disinformation in 2022, reinforcing our commitment to transparency and the fight against misinformation. As part of this initiative, we actively participated in the transition of the Code into a Code of Conduct under the Digital Services Act (DSA). This process marked a crucial step in strengthening the European Union's efforts to create a safer and more reliable information ecosystem.

VII. Empowering the fact-checking community

Commitment 33

	Newtral also maintains a continuous social media monitoring system in Spain, tracking disinformation narratives across major platforms as well as messaging apps such as Telegram and a tipline on WhatsApp. Our team publishes key findings and regularly shares insights and conclusions with the wider international fact-checking community, contributing to greater awareness, coordination, and preparedness in addressing evolving disinformation trends. Through this engagement, we aim not only to meet obligations but to help shape the collective response to disinformation across Europe—strengthening coordination, encouraging innovation, and reinforcing the credibility and effectiveness of the Code itself.
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X. Monitoring of Code

From January to June 2026, Newtral maintained its commitment to providing proportionate and appropriate information to support the European Commission's rapid response system. In this reporting period, Newtral's main contribution under this Commitment related to the crisis of immigration in Ceuta, for which Newtral engaged in extensive, real-time public verification and reporting actions, and became part of a dedicated Taskforce subgroup set up to address the crisis.

To coordinate this work and provide direct feedback on crisis response, Newtral's Head of Fact-Checking attended three meetings on this issue, including one in-person roundtable held in Brussels. This session brought together a small group of around 20 participants, including representatives from the European Commission, the EEAS, the European Parliament, online platforms and Spanish fact-checking members directly involved in the Ceuta response, and provided a constructive and open forum for discussion.

- Participation in discussions: contributed directly to Taskforce and roundtable discussions on the nature of the Ceuta situation, including whether it constituted a DSA-defined crisis, whether the Code of Conduct is the appropriate instrument to address it, and how to handle harmful content falling outside third-party fact-checking programmes.
- Reporting on field insights and experience: shared first-hand observations from its verification work on the ground, including its assessment that no clear evidence of coordinated inauthentic behaviour (CIB) was identified during the Ceuta events.
- Providing situational context: supplied platforms and institutional participants with up-to-date context on the disinformation dynamics observed around Ceuta, helping inform discussions on the operational demands of crisis-mode monitoring and reporting.
- Contributing to existing crisis-mitigation mechanisms: stressed the demonstrated impact of platforms' fact-checking programmes and highlighted the value of mechanisms already in place to mitigate crisis situations, while also underlining the need to safeguard fact-checkers' independence, noting that some parts of the fact-checking community view closer cooperation mechanisms with a degree of caution.

Beyond this coordination work, Newtral's daily workflow during the reporting period was also directly shaped by the crisis, with a marked increase in disinformation content requiring verification — both specifically related to the Ceuta situation and, more broadly, concerning immigration as a topic. This increase reinforced Newtral's core objectives under the Code: sustaining rapid, evidence-based debunking capacity at a moment of heightened public interest and vulnerability to manipulation, and ensuring that verified information reached both the public and platform partners promptly enough to be operationally useful. Notably, Newtral remains one of the few fact-checking organisations in Spain that consistently monitors and fact-checks political discourse, a capacity that proved particularly relevant during this period, as much of the disinformation and misleading framing around the Ceuta crisis originated in or was amplified by political statements and debate.

Our educational outreach through workshops and training programs across Spanish institutions served as an additional component of our preparedness strategy, building societal resilience against the types of disinformation tactics observed in other European contexts during this monitoring period.

X. Monitoring of Code

Commitment 43

Reporting on the service's response during a period of
crisis

Reporting on the service's response during a crisis

Crisis of immigration in Ceuta (August 2026)

Threats observed or anticipated at time of reporting: [suggested character limit 2000 characters].

Since the onset of the migration-related crisis in Ceuta in August 2026, Newtral has observed a marked escalation in coordinated disinformation activity targeting the situation. To date, Newtral has identified and reported through the Code's Rapid Response System (RRS) more than 70 pieces of false or misleading content related to the Ceuta crisis, using new and also established communication channels through which Newtral continuously reports to the EFCSN.

Primary threats identified include:

- Decontextualized and falsely attributed violent content: systematic circulation of violent videos and images, often unrelated to the current events or originating from other locations and time periods, deliberately presented as depicting the situation in Ceuta in order to amplify fear and social tension.
- False or misleading claims about official entities: a recurring pattern of fabricated statements, decisions, or positions falsely attributed to official bodies, including the United Nations and the governments of Morocco, Ceuta and Spain, aimed at undermining trust in institutional responses and fuelling confusion around the management of the crisis.

This event has generated a significant spike in Newtral's verification workload, given both the volume and the speed at which manipulated content has spread across platforms. Notably, in addition to Spanish-language content, Newtral has also identified and reported disinformation circulating in Arabic — a language outside its usual working scope — when such content was detected, in order to contribute to broader awareness and cross-lingual monitoring of the crisis within the network.

Newtral considers the risk of continued disinformation around Ceuta to remain elevated in the near term, given the sensitivity of the topic, its cross-border dimension, and the demonstrated willingness of malicious actors to exploit the crisis for political and social polarisation purposes.

Mitigations in place at time of reporting: [suggested character limit: 2000 characters].

Newtral implemented comprehensive countermeasures to address the Ceuta disinformation crisis through systematic debunking of the false and misleading narratives identified. Our response combined immediate fact-checking of viral, decontextualized content with continuous reporting to platforms via the EFCSN's Rapid Response System (RRS).

- Geolocation analysis: Newtral geolocated viral videos to establish their true origin. This method disproved, for example, footage of car burnings and violent unrest falsely attributed to Ceuta and Melilla, which was in fact recorded during unrelated disturbances in Nador, Morocco, on the other side of the border.
- Temporal verification and reverse image/video search: Newtral traced the original publication dates of recirculated footage, identifying content falsely presented as current — including images from Libya dating back to 2023 that were misrepresented as a "mass wave of migrants" or an "invasion of Europe."
- Source verification with official bodies: Newtral contacted relevant authorities directly to confirm or deny disputed claims, including Interior Ministry sources and the Government Delegation in Ceuta (to confirm a fabricated official communiqué on migrant transfers was not authentic), the Guardia Civil, and humanitarian NGOs operating on the ground.
- Fact-checking of institutional misattribution: Newtral debunked false claims attributed to international and foreign institutions, such as unfounded assertions that the UN classifies Ceuta and Melilla as "colonies" pending transfer to Morocco, and unverified statements attributed to Moroccan security officials regarding a purported invasion threat.
- Multichannel detection and response: In addition to open-source social media monitoring, Newtral used its WhatsApp verification channel to identify and respond to disinformation queries submitted directly by the public.

To date, this work has resulted in the verification of more than 70 pieces of Ceuta-related disinformation, each documented and reported through the RRS with detailed evidence of true origin, timeline and, where relevant, institutional confirmation, enabling rapid and evidence-based flagging to platform signatories.

Reporting on the service's response during elections

Three regional elections in Spain (Aragón, Castilla y León and Andalucía, February–May 2026)

Threats observed or anticipated at time of reporting: [suggested character limit 2000 characters].

Across the three Spanish regional elections held between February and May 2026 — Aragón (8 February), Castilla y León (15 March) and Andalucía (17 May) — Newtral identified a consistent pattern of election-related disinformation threats, alongside region-specific narratives tied to local candidates and issues.

Recurring threats identified across all three elections included:

- Voting-procedure disinformation: recurring false claims about what constitutes a null vote (e.g., writing on ballots, using envelopes from other elections, submitting two ballots from different parties), designed to confuse voters or discourage participation.
- Postal and electoral fraud narratives: content questioning the integrity of postal voting and vote-counting systems, including recurring false claims that private companies contracted for data transmission (e.g., Indra) are involved in counting votes, and misleading framing of statistical fluctuations in postal-vote figures as evidence of manipulation.
- AI-generated and deepfake content: growing use of AI to fabricate statements or images attributed to candidates, flagged as an emerging risk requiring dedicated detection guidance for the public.
- Fabricated interference in the campaign or in voting itself: including staged or decontextualized footage falsely presented as evidence of coercion at polling stations or campaign sabotage (e.g., a viral video from a 2023 election falsely recirculated as showing coercion during the 2026 Andalucía campaign).
- In Andalucía specifically, Newtral verified additional false narratives targeting individual candidates and public figures, including a fabricated claim that a musician's public endorsement of a candidate triggered mass concert-ticket refunds, and disinformation around the removal of campaign posters. In Aragón, Newtral also addressed disinformation around postal-vote figures and unfounded claims of irregularities such as "secret voting booth" failures.
- Beyond viral disinformation, Newtral anticipated and addressed a parallel risk: misleading or false statements made directly by candidates during televised debates (RTVE, Canal Sur, regional broadcasters) and campaign events, which required systematic, real-time political fact-checking rather than reactive debunking of user-generated content.

Mitigations in place at time of reporting: [suggested character limit: 2000 characters].

Between February and May 2026, Spain held three separate regional elections: the Cortes of Aragón (8 February 2026), the Cortes of Castilla y León (15 March 2026) and the Parliament of Andalucía (17 May 2026). Newtral deployed a consistent methodology across all three electoral processes, adapted to the specific dynamics and timelines of each campaign, with the following actions carried out:

- Pre-election anti-disinformation guides: ahead of each vote, Newtral published dedicated guides to help citizens identify and avoid falling for common types of election-related disinformation, tailored to the specific candidates, parties and local issues at stake in each region (e.g., the guide published ahead of the Aragón election and the guide published ahead of the Andalucía election).
- Early warning on potential campaign interference: Newtral flagged and reported on possible risks of interference or manipulation targeting the electoral campaigns, drawing attention to patterns observed in previous elections and emerging narratives specific to each region.
- Real-time monitoring during election day: Newtral tracked and verified information circulating during the electoral day itself in each of the three regions, responding promptly to claims and content requiring fact-checking as results were counted and reported.
- Practical training through the "Verificatón" hackathon (Andalucía): Newtral organised a fact-checking hackathon focused on the candidates' televised debate ahead of the Andalucía election, bringing together students from two Spanish universities to verify political discourse in a hands-on exercise alongside Newtral's own newsroom journalists. This initiative was carried out within the framework of IberCHECK, the cross-media fact-checking alliance led by Newtral with support from the European Commission, and reflects Newtral's broader commitment to building fact-checking capacity and training the next generation of verifiers to scrutinise political speech.
